## **Description**

Esther 6:7-14

When my sons were younger, they liked to watch stories featuring Thomas the Tank Engine. In those stories, there is an engine named Gordon. Gordon is big, strong, and fast, so he normally pulls the express. When asked to complete a task he deems unworthy of him, Gordon often says,  $\hat{a}$ ? Oh, the indignity.  $\hat{a}$ ?
